- Courses focus on developing key skills, including [National Association of Colleges & Employers \(NACE\) Career Readiness Competencies](#): critical thinking, equity & inclusion, communication (oral and written), leadership, professionalism, teamwork, and technology. Also, courses stress problem solving, ethical citizenship, and understanding of global issues.
- Consistent use of high impact learning techniques such as simulations and reflections.

- Developed new POSC 466: Travel Study in Political Science to take students to learn about politics and careers in Washington, DC. Class launched in May 2022. Theme was radicalization in US politics from the Founding to the Civil War to the Insurrection, using Barbara Walter's *How Civil Wars Start and How to Stop Them*. Career visits include alums in Congress, criminal justice, activism, along with visits to a public affairs graduate program and the International Spy Museum. Politics visits include: Lincoln Memorial, Mt. Vernon, Arlington Cemetery, National Archives, Ford's Theater, BLM Plaza, and insurrection sites. Created in the challenging and fluid post-COVID environment.
- With POSC 392: Political Science Careers host @six community/alumni speakers annually to guide students in career discovery.
- With colleagues, create the [Wicked Festival](#) to develop and showcase students' abilities to diagnose and solve persistent public problems. Administer the Wicked Festival with volunteer staff. The Wicked Festival is based on the interdisciplinary wicked problems tradition and the more recent book, *Creating Wicked Students: Designing Students for a Complex World* by Paul Hanstedt.
  - Fall 2023 event featured 472 students from 15 faculty members' courses across six colleges. The jump in size required taking over all three floors of Kyle Hall. With two nominations, my two student teams from US Foreign Policy won Distinguished Research gold and Outstanding Presentation gold.   - Spring 2023 event featured 278 students from nine classes across three colleges. New award created for student videos. Judging process improved through more, larger teams of judges including faculty, student, and alums. POSC 392 Careers students supported the event as volunteer staffers developing skills in event planning for their resumes. My students in POSC 490 presented on how to bring down dictators. They took three of the 10 Wicked Festival awards (Outstanding Presentation gold and bronze; Distinguished Research gold). POSC 342 Chinese Politics presented on an array of Chinese policy dilemmas.
  - Fall 2022 event featured 300 students from nine classes across three colleges. New disciplines like Marketing, English, Criminal Justice, and Social Work joined. Dr. Paul Hanstedt, author of *Creating Wicked Students*, served as distinguished guest speaker. Funds were raised from alums to support a more showcase event. High-end graphics designed to support the festival. [Website](#) created. New awards created in impactful solution, presentation, and research. In addition to administering the festival, my students in POSC 130 Changing the World presented on campus issues including active shooters, sexual assault, STDs, and domestic violence.   - Spring 2022 event featured 125 students from eight classes across three disciplines. Two directed research students presented their independent research. [Here is a video made by University Relations documenting the second Wicked Festival](#).
  - Fall 2021 event featured 100 students from seven classes across four disciplines. My POSC 130: Changing the World students presented on their semester change projects tackling problems from hunger, sexual assault, and trash on campus to abortion access and policing. My POSC 350 US Foreign Policy students offered their solutions to intractable international relations challenges for the US in the world.
