## Welcome, Welcome!

The sociology department is fortunate to have two, new faculty members with us this year. **Dr. Joanna Hunter** joined the faculty this fall as an Assistant Professor of Sociology. Before coming to Radford, and after completing her PhD at Florida State University, she taught at Saint Joseph's College in Indiana. This semester she is teaching Introductory Sociology (SOCY110) and will teach Men and Women in Society (SOCY 326) and Society and the Individual (SOCY 365). You can find Dr. Hunter in 205 Russell where you may find her rocking out at her desk while she works.





**Dr. Lawrence Eppard** joined the faculty this fall as an Assistant Professor of Sociology. Before coming to Radford University he taught sociology at both the University of Florida and Bethune-Cookman University while he was finishing his PhD at UF. This semester he is teaching Introduction to Sociology (SOCY110), Race and Ethnic Relations (SOCY331), and Sociology of the Family (SOCY389). # **Coming this Spring**

**Dr. Lyman** will be teaching a new course, **Unequal Opportunities** (SOCY 495), this spring. This special topics course will address the common American belief that our educational system is a great equalizer of sorts, leveling the playing field and creating equal opportunities for success to all Americans regardless of race, class, and gender. In this class, students will discover how the American educational system actually perpetuates inequalities among Americans, from nursery school to graduate school. **Dr. Wagner** will be teaching the Practicum in Sociology (SOCY 493). In this class, students will be a part of the Floyd County High School Place-Based Education Project and get experience in mentoring high school students in a project that includes: ethnographic and oral history interviewing; preparing interviews for web presentation via the Internet; content, theme analysis, and archiving of video and audio recordings, photographs, and print materials; and movie-making. # Dr. Wagner and the Appalachian Teaching Project

ARC of APPALACHIAN to REGIONAL COMMISSION

Dr. Melinda Wagner's Scholar-Citizen Initiative (SCI) class, SOCY 482 Qualitative Research Methods, combined with APST 495 Research in Appalachia, is participating in the Appalachian Regional Commission's Appalachian Teaching Project (ATP). Each of the 16 participating universities offers a course in which students address the question, "How do we build on community assets to shape a positive future for Appalachia?" The Radford University project was sparked by Floyd County Virginia's Land Policy Task Force that found that "What Matters Most" to Floyd County

residents was "preservation of rural character, Appalachian heritage, and community identity." The Appalachian Teaching Project will research what residents want to preserve and study perceptions of potential threats to those values. In the meantime, the course is teaching students the skills to become effective community leaders who understand the importance of community values.

## Kudos to Dr. Corroto...and Cleveland

Carla Corroto published "When Will Architects Speak Up for Women's Rights?" in Architecture Daily and "The Architecture of Choice: Re-framing Feminism," in the Australian journal Parlour: Women, Equity, Architecture. Dr. Corroto presented "The Jumbo-Shrimp of Professions: The Oxymoronic Relationship between Architecture and Feminism," at International Congress of Qualitative Inquiry at the University of Illinois, Champagne Urbana in May.
