Beginning in May 2012, Dr. LaLone began working as an applied Museum Planning Consultant for the New River Historical Society's Wilderness Road Regional Museum in Newbern, Virginia. This linkage with the museum will allow us to offer a great mini-project for the Fall 2015 SOCY 486, "Engaging the Community" class, and the potential for possible internships. In this class, students will learn the most effective community-based approaches, methods, and career skills for successfully partner-

## Chasing the American Dream

The Public Sociology program was honored to host esteemed sociologist Dr. Robert Rank on October 29 in the Bondurant Auditorium. His visit to RU was sponsored by the Sociology Club and the Program in Public Sociology, the Center for Social and Cultural Research, the Scholar-Citizen Initiative, the Center for Diversity and Inclusion, and the

Club Programming Committee. His talk, which was very well attended, summarized his book Chasing the American Dream which was based on longitudinal data and examined the role of race and class on Americans' relative success and failure.



#### Out of the Classroom

**Dr. Carla Corroto** is on the program for the Safe-Spaces Workshop for Women's History Month at RU and will direct a seminar on "The architecture of safety: How space informs our 'place.'"

**Dr. Corroto** presented her research "Women in and out of architecture: Investigating attrition" at the Sociologists for Women in Society Winter Meeting in Washington DC on February 13. She also presented a qualitative methods paper titled "Disciplined bodies: Education, identity and uniform authority," at the Couch Stone Symposium in St. Petersburg, Florida on March 14. She will make a theory presentation for the Feminism and Architecture: Women, Architecture, and Academia Conference in New York City at Parsons The New School for Design in April. Importantly, Dr. Corroto will spend the rest of the year celebrating (some say gloating over,) the NCAA National Championship in football.

Presenting theory papers at the Big South Undergraduate Research Symposium are **Kelly Soloe**, "Sociological Theories Present in Chicago" and **Tyiesha Pannell**, "Brenda's got a baby,"

**Dr. Lawrence Eppard**, along with RU Sociology majors **Deryk Jackson and Maddie Reda**, is presenting a paper entitled "Status and Individualism" at the Spring meetings of the Southern Sociological Society in New Orleans, LA. This paper is based on data collected through the **Center for Social and Cultural Research** and examines poverty and inequality attribution ideologies among low-status workers.

**Dr. Joanna Hunter** presented at the annual meeting of the **American Sociological Association** in San Francisco, CA in August 2014. Her paper, entitled "Towards a Conceptual Measure of Religious Identity Development" was based on pilot data collected at RU and she is now working with Sociology major **Bianca Dickerson** and the **Center for Social and Cultural Research** to expand that paper and present at the annual meeting of the **Association for the Sociology of Religion** in Chicago, IL in August 2015.

**Dr. Hunter** has been selected as the keynote speaker for the Recognizing Excellence in Diversity Awards ceremony on April 15. She is working on her talk, entitled "Having the Courage to Be The Change," in between diaper changes and feeding sessions.
