- 1910 Established by the General Assembly as the State Normal and Industrial School for Women
- 1913 Industrial School for Women at Radford opened its doors
- 1914 The name changed to State Normal School for Women

- 1979 Radford College was granted university status and name was changed to Radford University
- 1980 First Radford University degrees awarded
- 2005 General Assembly approves RU for first Doctoral Program
- 2008 Radford University enrolls first Doctoral students into Counseling Psychology, Psy.D
- 2008 Radford University Gains Level II Authority along with James Madison University, Virginia Military Institute, Old Dominion University and George Mason University
- 2009 Radford University admits first students into the Master of Occupational Therapy Program

Radford University is one of Virginia's finest coeducational institutions. As in its previous history, Radford maintains a dedication to students with an emphasis on personalized attention and instruction. A low student-to-faculty ratio allows students to interact with their professors both in and out of the classroom. Radford University is a comprehensive public university with highly diverse curricula for undergraduates and selected graduate programs. Undergraduate majors include over 106 program options in the Colleges of Business and Economics, Education and Human Development, Health and Human Services, Humanities and Behavioral Sciences, Science and Technology, and Visual and Performing Arts. The College of Graduate and Professional Studies offers 38 programs of study at the doctoral, master's and specialist levels. These programs provide advanced and specialized courses of study, supervised practicum experiences, and opportunities for research. The university has an outstanding nationally recruited faculty, 84 percent of whom hold doctorates or other terminal degrees in their teaching fields. While their primary focus is on the teaching and learning process, faculty are also engaged in professional development benefiting students" classroom experience as well as bringing notoriety to the campus.


The Radford University Mission Statement

Radford University Board of Visitors

Radford University is governed by a 13-member board that was created under Virginia state law. Eleven of the members are appointed by the Governor of the Commonwealth and serve four-year terms. Each year, the Board also selects a student and a faculty member to serve as advisory representatives on the Board. The Board meets in regular session four times each year, generally in February, May, August and November; however, all times are subject to the discretion of the Board. The third meeting of each calendar year, generally to be held in August, is considered the first meeting of the year and is designated as the "Annual Meeting of the Board." Board meetings are held in the Board Room in Martin Hall.

Dr. Donna Boyd, Eminent Professor Co-Director, Forensic Science Institute Professor of Anthropology

Dr. Donna Boyd was the 2006 recipient of the prestigious **U.S. Professor of the Year Award for Outstanding Master's Universities and Colleges Professors**. This national and highly coveted award recognizes "those who excel as educators and influence the lives and careers of their students" and "is the only national program to recognize excellence in undergraduate teaching and mentoring." Only one recipient in each category receives this award annually. Dr. Boyd is the first faculty member at Radford University to receive the award in the history of the institution and just the fourth faculty member from any Virginia institution to receive it in the 26 years of the program"s existence. Dr. Boyd was selected from a pool of hundreds of outstanding nominees submitted by institutions across the country.

Nomination portfolios for the U.S. Professor of the Year Award were judged by panels of experts including senior academic officials, faculty, education reporters, students, and government, corporate, foundation and association representatives. The primary characteristic the judges consider is an "extraordinary dedication to undergraduate teaching."

Dr. Boyd is currently the co-Director of Radford University"s Forensic Science Institute and recently became only the second forensic anthropologist in Virginia to be certified by the American Board of Forensic Anthropology. Dr. Boyd's current work involves taking DNA samples from unidentified human remains in hopes of matching them with some of the nation"s reported missing persons.


- 7,819 applications were received in 2008 for New Freshmen. Of these, 37.4 percent were from the Northern Virginia Regions. The Southwest Virginia and Roanoke Metro regions accounted for 10 percent of the applications
- The number of new freshmen increased 23 percent over the last ten years from 1,526 in 1998 to 1,875 in 2008
- The number of new transfers have slightly decreased over the last ten years from 675 in 1998 to 671 in 2008
- Ninety-one percent of new freshmen were from Virginia, sixty percent were female, and thirteen percent were minority students
- The top five feeder high schools for new freshmen were Westfield High School (N=42), Loudoun Valley High School (N=33), Chantilly High School (N=28), Broad Run High School (N=27), and Mills E Godwin High School (N=27)
- The top five majors of incoming freshmen were Pre-Major (N=423), Pre-Business (N=172), Pre-Nursing (N=133), Interdisciplinary Studies (N=121), and Exercise, Sport and Health Education (N=104)
- The 25th percentile of combined SAT scores for new freshmen increased over the past 10 years from 900 in 1998 to 930 in 2008
- The 25th percentile of high school GPAs for new freshmen increased over the past ten years from 2.68 in 1998 to 2.84 in 2008
- The top five previous institutions of new transfer students are New River Community College (N=112), Virginia Western Community College (N=76), Southwest Virginia Community College (N=30), Northern Virginia Community College/Annandale Site (N=25), and Wytheville Community College (N=24)
- The top five majors of new transfer students for fall 2008 are Pre-Business (N=64), Pre-Nursing (N=55), Computer Science and Technology (N=44), Interdisciplinary Studies Elementary Education (N=40), and Exercise, Sport and Health Education (N=37)







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Enrollment Highlights

- Radford University enrolled its first students in the university's first doctoral program
- There were a total of 9,157 students enrolled at Radford University during Fall 2008, 8,155 undergraduate students and 1,002 graduate students
- Thirty-two percent of all RU undergraduates were the first in their family to attend college
- Thirty-one percent of the first generation students at RU are from the Southwest Virginia and Roanoke Metro regions
- Student enrollment has increased seven percent over the past ten years going from 8579 in fall 1999 to 9,157 in fall 2008
- The fall 2008 undergraduate student body was largely full-time (95%) and from in-state (92%) while graduate enrollment was more part-time (57%) and had a slightly higher percentage of out-of-state students (12%)
- Females constituted fifty-seven percent (N=4,652) of undergraduate students and seventy-six percent of graduate students (N=761)
- The top five highest enrolled undergraduate majors in Fall 2008 were Pre-Major (N=588), Interdisciplinary Studies Elementary Education (N=521), Exercise, Sport and Health Education (N=503), Pre-Business (N=450), and Criminal Justice (N=442)
- The top five highest enrolled graduate majors in Fall 2008 were Counseling and Human Development (N=122), Social Work (N=119), Education (N=102), Educational Leadership (N=83), and Business Administration (N=71)




Region of Residency for In-State Students at Radford University Fall 2008

DEGREES CONFERRED

Academic Programs and Degrees Conferred Highlights

- The number of total degrees awarded increased by 18.4 percent over the past five years going from 1,911 degrees awarded in 2003-04 to 2,263 in 2007-08.
- RU conferred a total of 1,825 degrees awarded at the bachelor's level for first majors for 2007-08, while 122 undergraduates also earned a second major. There were 438 degrees awarded at the graduate level, which includes 12 Post-Masters certificates.
- Radford University currently offers 68 degrees at the bachelor's level in 37 different disciplines and 22 degrees offered at the master's level in 17 disciplines.
- The largest number of bachelor's degrees awarded for 2007-08 was in Interdisciplinary Studies with a total of 231 degrees. At the master's level the largest number of degrees was obtained by students majoring in the Education program, where 62 total degrees were awarded in this area.
- RU's library services currently houses a wide variety of books and media essential to the learning of its students. The library has 1,918,571 separate holdings for its students.






Faculty and Staff Highlights

- As of fall 2008, RU employed 1,446 (1196-full-time and 250 part-time) people
- Full-time employees (1,196) included 400 faculty members, 235 academic professionals, and 561 classified employees.
- Unduplicated part-time employees totaled 250 including 181 part-time faculty, 33 academic professionals, and 36 wage employees.
- Of the 400 Full-time faculty, 32% (130) were Full Professors, 20% (79) were Associate Professors, 34% (137) were Assistant Professors and 14% (54) were instructors.
- Around 47% of the full-time faculty is female.
- 52% of the full-time faculty is tenured and another thirty percent are on tenure track.
- Eighty-four percent of the full-time faculty holds a terminal degree.
- One-third of the full-time faculty is currently assigned to the College of Humanities and Behavioral Sciences.



Fact Book Information 2008-2009

Technology at RU – Radford University maintains a robust technology infrastructure to support the computing needs of students and faculty. RU is committed to the integration of technology into the learning environment. With the growth of mobile computing, Radford has built a strong wireless and mobile computer infrastructure to promote anytime anywhere learning. Over 85% of Radford University faculty have a mobile computer. Wi-Fi connections have been installed throughout campus providing wireless network connectivity in all campus buildings. RU also prides itself on providing multimedia resources for faculty and students in campus classrooms.

Radford University provides the following technology services:

- One OC3 (155 Mbit/s) Internet connection via COVANET.
- One DS3 (45 Mbit/s) Internet connection via Network Virginia.
- Internet2 connectivity through Network Virginia.
- Gigabit Ethernet connectivity between campus buildings.
- Residence Halls with two 100 Mbits/s Ethernet connections and wireless access in every room.
- 377 wireless access points providing 54 Mbit/s 802.11g Wi-Fi connectivity throughout campus.
- VPN connectivity for secure connections from off campus
- File Server Storage, Web Hosting, and Exchange e-mail for all students and faculty
- The Highlander Connection web portal, providing a single place to access campus technology resources
- Blackboard CE (WebCT) for 24-hour access to web enhanced classes
- Adobe Acrobat Connect (Breeze) for web conferencing and online classes
- iTunes University participation with over 900 podcasts online
- 710 workstations available in computer labs and public areas for student use.
- A Microsoft Campus Agreement providing students with access to Microsoft Office and Microsoft Windows.
- 170 rooms with a complete multimedia podium including computer, data projector, VCR/DVD, and visual presenter.
- 39 rooms with data projector and VCR/DVD.
- The RU campus includes 5 classrooms, 1 conference room and 5 portable videoconferencing units utilized for Distance Education and on-demand videoconferencing.
- RU maintains 2 classrooms and 8 portable videoconferencing units located at the Roanoke Higher Education Center, Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center, Martinsville New College Institute (NCI) and Woodrow Wilson Rehab Center in Staunton.

Fact Book Information 2008-2009

In January 2007, the University launched a major multi-year project designed to review, replace and enhance the university's administrative information systems. These core systems include undergraduate and graduate admissions, financial aid, registration and records, student housing, advancement and fundraising, financials, budget, human resources and the current portal. Together, these systems provide the business processing, data retrieval, reporting and self-service functions critical to providing essential services to faculty, staff, students, prospective students, alumni and the entire university community.

The University chose SunGard Higher Education"s Banner administrative systems suite to replace the current systems. Implementation phases of Banner began in June 2007, and will continue through Spring 2010. When complete, the following components of the SunGard Banner system and supporting ancillary systems will be operational:

- Banner Student and related self service components
- Banner Human Resources and related self service components
- Banner Advancement and related self service components
- Banner Financial Aid and related self service components




GIFTS AND GRANTS

Sponsored Programs and Grants Management

The faculty, staff, and students of Radford University have again brought in more than \$5 million in grants, contracts, and cooperative agreements. This means that for the past eight years, the Radford University community has brought in over \$5 million annually in awards.

Seventy-five awards were received, totaling \$6,018,656 during the year ended June 30, 2009. The success may be seen in the following graph.



The small spike in FY 2004 is actually caused by changing databases. Prior to implementing an Access database, it had been necessary to cut off the fiscal year in mid-June to allow us to report in a timely manner. In fiscal year 2004, we began in mid-June of 2003 and ended the year on June 30, giving that year two extra weeks and hundreds of thousands more in funding for that year, rather than the next.

GRANT AND CONTRACT EXPENDITURES

Information included on grants and contracts <u>awarded</u> is useful because it gives a forecast of the immediate future and includes all faculty- and staff-initiated projects, whether administered by Radford University or by the Radford University Foundation. An examination of <u>expenditures</u>, on the other hand, is more useful in comparing one year's activity with others. This is for two reasons.

First, some awards are multiple-year grants with all funds awarded in the first year; so for example, a three-year grant awarded all in the first year would be recorded as a large award during the first year and would not appear in reports of the following two years. The expenditure report, which we have just begun to use, shows a less volatile picture.

Second, awards are reported when the Office of Sponsored Programs and Grants Management receives official notification and sets up the account. Many of Radford University"s largest grants are awarded directly or indirectly by the Commonwealth of Virginia. Most of those awards are received either in June, at the very end of one fiscal year, or in July, at the beginning of the following fiscal year. This means that for a project that is continuing for multiple years, two 12-month awards could be noted in the same year, while in other years, there would be no awards recorded.

Please note that the expenditure report shows only those projects awarded to Radford University and does not include awards administered by the Radford University Foundation, as those expenditures are not captured by the University accounting system.

In addition to the money for sponsored agreements, \$186,428 was spent in *Seed Grants, Proposal Development Awards, Mentoring Assistance Awards, Travel to Agency Awards,* and *Research Support Accounts* within various departments and colleges.

The dollar value of the submissions was up by 12%, while the number submitted was up 8% from 103 in Fiscal Year 2008. Two-thirds of the submissions were for new projects or to new potential sponsors; about 26% were for continuations or renewals and 7% of the submissions were for supplements to existing awards.

Workshops and Information Sessions 2008-2009

The Office of Sponsored Programs and Grants Management provided workshops and information sessions on several different topics during the year, several in repeated sessions. About twenty individuals attended one or more sessions during the year. The list of workshops and seminars presented follows:

The office also held two Research Interest Luncheons to encourage collaborations in research. These luncheons were each attended by about 80 faculty and staff members. Each luncheon featured an external guest speaker and the second also featured several speakers from on campus who discussed their current research projects.

INTERNAL GRANT PROGRAMS TO ASSIST IN SECURING EXTERNAL AWARDS

Seed Grants, Proposal Development Awards, Mentoring Assistance Program Awards, and Travel to Agencies funds are offered to enable members of the faculty and staff to secure competitive awards. Of the seventeen proposals submitted this year, thirteen (77%) were judged to be ready for the investment of funds and were awarded.

Deadlines are three times a year for the three large programs: October 1, February 1, and April 1. Applicants for the *Quick Response* and *Travel to Agencies* programs may submit at any time.

Mentoring Assistance Program (MAP) is a program to fund Seed Grant and Proposal Development projects with the addition of an experienced individual to help faculty members reach a new level within grants and contracts. Funds for mentoring may be sought for a variety of purposes, including research design, a specific research technique, developing or managing a multi-institutional project, or proposal writing.

These short-term awards are primarily to purchase time for a principal author and/or assistant to write a competitive award for a specific Request for Proposal (RFP) without much lead time.

<u>Travel to Agencies</u> Radford University has funded travel to speak to program officers about proposal drafts for a number of years.

ACADEMINIC ENHANCEMENT

Honors Academy

The Honors Academy is a Center for Excellence at Radford University that serves as a focus for student-faculty collaborative scholarship. Honors courses are all General Education courses taught by faculty in a highly interactive and engaging environment. Honors Sections are limited to 20 students, and may involve field trips, and special in-class activities well suited to a highly interactive environment. The Honors Academy also sponsors "wireless" sections of some of its courses in which the professor designs the course with the knowledge that each student will attend class with a wireless laptop or tablet computer. Faculty in these sections have integrated online test submission and grading, visits to internet sites, WebCT, Breeze Live, cross campus collaboration and other applications into their classroom teaching. Our faculty have led panel discussions about using tablet computers in a wireless classroom at state and regional conferences, and are updating a booklet of "Best Practices in Wireless Teaching" in the Spring of 2008. Honors students "contract" classes in their majors for honors credit by working on individual projects dealing with the subject matter in the class. Often these projects substitute for other class requirements.

The Honors Academy also fosters student faculty collaborative scholarship throughout the campus and sponsors travel for dozens of students and faculty mentors to national, regional and statewide conferences each year. Each Spring, the Honors Academy also hosts our campus" annual Undergraduate/Graduate Student Engagement Forum. Demonstrating that student/faculty collaborative scholarship is becoming a hallmark of a Radford University education, over 200 students, mentored by 60 faculty made more than 150 presentations and performances in the Forum last Spring semester (2008). Only a few years ago there were less than 100 such presentations. Thirty or more graduating Highlander Scholars who are required to present the results of their Honors Capstone Projects are among the participants at each Forum. Presentations included original dance performances, musical performances, independent study projects, study abroad projects and undergraduate laboratory research carried out by students as a result of their work with faculty. During the final evening of the Forum, recipients of the Faculty/Student Collaborative Grants Program presented the results of their work together. Another feature of the Forum is the organization of special topics symposia in Sociology, Forensic Anthropology, Chemistry, Psychology, Physics and Gender Studies.

A mutually supportive academic and social environment for Honors Academy members is maintained in Floyd and Perry residence halls where individuality is encouraged and academic commitments and responsibilities are respected. Approximately one third of the 180 residents are upperclassmen while the other two-thirds are new freshmen. Many sections of the Honors General Education courses are taught in the basement classrooms of these buildings which have a full complement of multimedia equipment and a wireless computing environment.

The Honors Academy also hosts an annual banquet to honor Graduating Highlander Scholars and recognize new Highlander Scholars. In contrast to 5 and 2 graduates only 7 and 6 years ago, respectively, 41 candidates for Graduation in 2008 will invite their parents and faculty capstone mentors for an early evening meal and celebration. Faculty mentors have prepared short statements about their student collaborators which are read aloud as the students are called to the podium to receive their gold stoles signifying status as a graduating Highlander Scholar. The Honors Academy itself continues to grow as the total number of participants presently sits at approximately 500. This past Fall semester we took in approximately 150 new freshman participants with another 75 joining the Academy at the beginning of Spring Semester. It is anticipated that within the next year or two that we will graduate 50 – 60 Highlander Scholars per year.

New Student Programs

Orientation Programs

The goal of all orientation programs is to begin to facilitate the academic and personal transition of new students and families into the institution. Opportunities are provided for parent and student interaction with other new students, families, current students, faculty and staff. Information sessions addressing the institution"s academic expectations, developmental and social opportunities, and resources are also presented. The main objective during all programs is to academically advise and register new students for the upcoming semester's courses. Faculty advisors and undergraduate student leaders offer new students guidance and reassurance during the time they are on campus. Through new student orientation students and families develop an understanding of the intellectual, cultural and social climate of the institution.

New Student Orientation

New Student Orientation is Radford University"s two day summer undergraduate new freshmen and family orientation program. Faculty advisors and Orientation Assistants, undergraduate student leaders, work most closely with students and Parent Orientation Guides (POGs), also student leaders, to serve the families.

Learning Assistance and Resource Center (LARC)


The Warren P. Self Learning Assistance & Resource Center (LARC) at Radford University is an all-inclusive academic support service open to the entire Radford University community. Both graduate and undergraduate students are invited to make appointments for free tutoring in math, statistics, accounting and finance, science, writing, reading, and basic learning and test-taking strategies. The LARC also works collaboratively with other departments to enhance the overall learning experience for the students of Radford University.

The LARC tutoring force is largely comprised of undergraduate and graduate students from various disciplines. Tutors undergo extensive training based on the College Reading and Learning Association's international certification standards. Writing tutors aid students with writing assignments for any discipline, while math/statistics and science tutors help students understand formula, grasp abstract concepts, and reinforce problem solving skills. Additionally, students can improve and maximize their learning skills, reading comprehension, and test taking strategies. LARC tutors work individually with students, facilitate workshops and study groups, and represent the LARC during official University sponsored programs.

Inspired by a holistic approach to tutoring, LARC staff members are trained to make referrals if they detect other issues at play in students" lives. Becoming a tutor is an excellent way for Radford University students to increase their leadership skills, assist peers with academic challenges, and build their resumes.

The LARC encourages Radford University students to address their academic challenges through proactive measures. Students are empowered to succeed by taking responsibility for their own education and learning. With a learner-centered approach, the LARC staff and tutors seek to meet each Radford University student's academic needs.

Student Health Services

Radford University Student Health Service provides basic health care to students on an outpatient basis, Monday through Friday. All registered students are eligible for services. The student health center is equipped to provide diagnosis and treatment for most of the health problems encountered by students, as well as follow up care and referrals to a network of local specialists. RU Student Health Services:

- Has been accredited by the Accreditation Association of Ambulatory Health Care, Inc (AAAHC) since 1999
- Serves over 13,000 students annually
- Provides a 24/7 Nurseline call service
- The medical staff includes: 1 Physician of Record, 2 Nurse Practitioners, and 3 Licensed Practical Nurses*
- * All medical staff members are licensed by the state of Virginia and all providers are nationally certified.

Student Counseling Services

Student Counseling Services is a place where students can talk privately and confidentially about issues which are of concern to them with a licensed mental health professional. Students frequently seek assistance with issues such as stress, anxiety, depression, relationships, lack of motivation and family concerns to name a few. Services at SCS are free to currently enrolled undergraduate and graduate students at Radford University. Confidentiality is strictly maintained for information shared in counseling. Services include:

- Short term, mental health services to RU students
- Individual, couples and group counseling
- Consultation services
- Referral services available when specialized services or long term therapy are necessary
- Crisis services during office hours; after hour emergencies are referred to ACCESS (New River Valley Community Services Board) or CONNECT (Carilion Health System)
- Programming/outreach on relevant mental health issues as available
- Part-time psychiatrist on campus.

Student Counseling Services employs two full-time, licensed mental health professionals, one part-time consulting psychiatrist, one health educator and a nurse practitioner.

The Disability Resource Center

Radford University is dedicated to providing equal educational opportunities for otherwise qualified students with documented disabilities. The Disability Resource Office (DRO) provides reasonable academic accommodations and services to facilitate the university goal of removing physical, attitudinal, and technological barriers which might infringe upon any individual to fully participate in the University experience. Accommodations are provided based on review of current documentation and upon completion of a student interview. Accommodations shall not alter the technical standards of a program or the integrity of Radford University.

The types of disabilities accommodated include but are not limited to: Learning disabilities, Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD), vision, hearing, speech, psychiatric, physical, neurological, medical, and temporary. Sixty-five percent of the students served have ADHD, LD or a combination of both. The most common accommodations are: extra time on tests, quiet room for testing and note taker.

Student Support Services

Student Support Services (SSS) is a grant-funded program operating under the umbrella of the Federal TRIO programs and financially supported by the United States Department of Education (DOE). SSS is designed to assist RU students who are considered at-risk to attain a baccalaureate degree. DOE defines the at-risk population as students who are first generation and/or low income, as well as those students who have a documented disability.

Student Support Services is independently funded by the U.S. Department of Education at a level of \$292,909 per year and accommodates 160 students. Participation is limited and dictated by grant specifications. Over the past 15 years, SSS has served approximately 2,250 students.

Radford University Athletics

The Radford University athletic program offers 19 varsity sports, eight for men and 11 for women. Robert Lineburg is the athletic director at Radford University. He was appointed on November 1, 2007.

The athletic program has grown dramatically since 1974-75, when men's sports were first offered on a varsity level. Men's basketball and tennis joined women's tennis, basketball and volleyball to form the heart of the Highlanders' growing athletic program in 1974-75. A year later, in 1975-76, the first men's soccer team was organized.

Radford currently offers men's and women's basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, tennis, indoor and outdoor track, along with field hockey, swimming & diving, softball and volleyball for women, and baseball for men.

Radford helped found the **<u>Big South Conference</u>** in 1984 and has been a prominent figure in the 25-year old league.
